These charges are meant to cover the costs of the HSE's intervention and enforcement actions and are currently charged at £166 per hour. For organisations, the potential ramifications of getting it wrong and facing an FFI charge can be significant. Apart from the financial burden of the FFI, it also

signals that the organisation's health and safety practices are not up to the required standards. This could lead to reputational damage, loss of business opportunities, and potential legal actions.
